Introduction

[Greeting:] — Welcome to "The Armor of Faith," a show where we hope to bring our listeners closer to the Word of God and the blessings we receive through living in the fullness of the Catholic faith. My name is Doug and I will be your host as we discuss the blessings of the Church Christ built upon Peter.

As I am sure most of our listeners know, "Magnificat is a monthly publication designed for daily use, to encourage both liturgical and personal prayer. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit we pray. Amen.

Faith Event Announcements:

If you have been out and about on social media, you probably noticed headlines to the effect of "Four Exorcists Urge Day of Fasting, Prayer and Reparation Dec. 6." (Dail) According to the *National Catholic Register*, the priests stated they are asking for this, "for the purpose of driving out any diabolic influence within the Church that has been gained as a result of recent events." (Dail) While the statement specifically references the Amazon Synod controversies, we can probably pick from any number of recent events which are cause for concern of the faithful.

The priests also stated, "These events bring home the reality that we are in spiritual warfare, and that warfare is happening with the Church itself." (Dail) The reality is that the church has been under attack from the moment Christ said to Peter, "And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16:18)

No matter where we may fall concerning our political perceptions, we must also remember to what we are called as we are reminded in 1 Peter 3:8-9, "Finally, all of you, be of one mind, sympathetic, loving toward one another, compassionate, humble. Do not return evil for evil, or insult for insult; but, on the contrary, a blessing, because to this you were called, that you might inherit a blessing."

As you may remember during our series, "Put on the Armor of Prayer," (see episodes 107 through 115), we pointed out that a blessing is an invocation of God's power and care. (cf. CCC: pg 868), so when we pray for a blessing upon the church and one another, we should take comfort that we are asking for God's power and care. Whether we ask a blessing for a loved one or someone who does not like us very much, a prayer for God's blessing always calls for a positive end.

As we face the divisions of our day, you have heard me mention before, it is not a matter of whether the right or left are right or wrong, it is a matter of whether we understand what God asks of us.

Towards this end, we invite you to participate in this First Friday prayer because we all need the help of our Lord to achieve to what we are called in 1 Peter 3:8-9, and we must also keep in mind the pleas of Our Blessed Mother as she calls us to the Sacred Heart of her Son, as well as prayer, fasting, and penance so we may receive the wonderful graces offered through our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

If you happen to be listening to this episode via one of our on-demand channels, and the date of the event has already passed, it is not too late. We ask you to consider joining in prayer; seeking unity of all within His Holy Church in the manner in which God asks of us, and in reparation and penance for the ways we have offended God. You can join during the next First Friday, or if that is not possible, perhaps a First Saturday. No matter the day, time, or place; let us remember what we are told in CCC: 2691, "The choice of a favorable place is not a matter of indifference for true prayer." No matter our concern, we should all keep in prayer petitions for God's help towards building the unity of our Church along with our prayers of sorrow and penance for our sins.

Why Catholics Do What We Do:

Today we begin discussion on the first Sacrament of Initiation. Baptism. What do we know about this sacrament? Why do we do it? Is this necessary for salvation? How did it come about?

According to CCC: 1213:

(CCC: 1213)

Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (*vitae spiritualis ianua*), and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: "Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word."

To baptize means to plunge or immerse into water. Recall the story of John the Baptist and of how he was the one to come before Christ. John announced the coming of Jesus' ministry as he Baptized people in the River Jordan. Baptism was to free the person from generational sin and to restore life eternal. This act was so important to Christ that he approached John so that he too might be baptized, even though He Himself was never stained by sin.

As stated in CCC 1224:

(CCC: 1224)

Our Lord voluntarily submitted himself to the baptism of St. John, intended for sinners, in order to "fulfill all righteousness." Jesus' gesture is a manifestation of his self-emptying. The Spirit who had hovered over the waters of the first creation descended then on the Christ as a prelude of the new creation, and the Father revealed Jesus as his "beloved Son."

That was at the very beginning of His ministry. Jesus deemed this act to be of such importance that he told his Apostles to Baptize as we are told in Matthew 28:19:

(Matthew 29:19)

Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Baptism was to be done as Jesus said, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and with using water as the manner of cleansing away sin. This formula has been part of the Catholic Church since its very beginning. Baptism was the opening of the door for one to become a Catholic/Christian. No forms to fill out, no two picture identifications to prove who they were and no payments to be made. Only the desire to be Christian and to be willing to continue learning about, following, and loving Jesus, was required to be Baptized.

When the Apostles began their ministries, they traveled in patterns. Patterns that were to take them to different lands and tribes where they would teach, convert, and Baptize. When they had accomplished the task for one nation, they moved on to another. I think of this as moving in circles for they would work one community, move to another and then another and then another. Eventually they would return to continue the process of educating the new Christians.

Since their mode of transportation was to walk, it took many years for them to actually reach the various tribes before returning to ones they had already converted. Due to cultural customs of the times, the Apostles were not allowed to mingle with the families, so they instructed the fathers, the heads of the families. While the Apostle was away to care for other tribes and nations, the father would teach his family about Jesus. When the Apostle did return, he baptized entire families, babies included. Thus began the tradition of which Catholics continue to this day. We baptize babies so that they may also be freed from *original sin* and brought into the light of Christ.

Original Sin is that generational sin we all inherited because of the sins of Adam and Eve. Remember the story of Eve being tempted by the devil to eat an apple of the one tree in the garden of which God told them to not eat? They bowed down to temptation, ate, and were then banned from Eden. This sin has been passed on to each of us from that time. Baptism is the Sacrament that removes this sin from us and allows us to cross the bridge from darkness into light----from sin into holiness.

Soo much to talk about and so little time. We will continue this Baptismal journey next week and look at other Scripture passages that explain more fully the history of Baptism and why it is so important to our lives.

Discussion:

As we concluded our last discussion, I mentioned that the education and encouragement of our youth is what enables them to make a better world. We also discussed that parents have the primary responsibility for providing that education and encouragement for our children, but it is a task which can be quite overwhelming, especially with all of the distractions of the world.

While some parents may have the resources to vet and select the institution which will best assist them, most must rely upon secular institutions which are motivated more by political agendas rather than what is best, right, and just for the souls of our children. Parents are the first line of defense for those souls and they must be aware and learn themselves if they are to so teach their children and supervise what their children receive through other channels.

The art is imprecise and will require many adjustments along the way to adapt to the uniqueness of each child and their experiences in the world. Parents are also left with the difficult task of vetting the assistance available and helping their children comprehend light and truth within a

sea of competing values and nuances of politics. This task has become even more difficult in the politically charged world of our day as amplified by numerous media channels.

The first and most important step in caring for the gift God has given us through our children is love along with communication of that love. If we endeavor to understand the meaning and purpose of God's design and ask God to help us in carrying out the responsibilities we have for the raising of our youth, then, we may be better prepared when He asks us, "What did you do with the gifts I gave you?"

Towards that end, we are going to turn our discussion today to domestic catechesis. Of course, our local parishes provide various, age appropriate religious formation programs, but to truly enable our children to learn and incorporate into their lives that which God asks of us requires parental engagement. One enabler to such engagement are resources which help parents explain not just what we do as Catholics in the worship of our Lord, but also why.

We invited Father Sebastian and John to join us today, because we believe *Magnificat* has some excellent resources which can assist parents as they endeavor to teach their children as well as enable them to bring the fullness of the Catholic faith into their homes.

Let everything take second place to our care of our children, our bringing them up to the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

Final Thoughts:

We have all heard the cliché, "knowledge is power." The reason for this is that knowledge enables our understanding as well as our ability to make good choices. The opposite, of course, is that what we do not know can hurt us. We must also remember, our choices are not just about living in this world, but also preparing for what comes after. It is for this reason that I often comment that those who do not know their faith leave themselves vulnerable to the one who would take it from them.

We should reflect upon this very heavily as we consider the education and faith formation of our children. They have much to learn in the world, not only so they may assume their role in adulthood, but also in preparation for what comes after. At first, we are there to walk with them and to help to defend them, but we must also prepare them for the day they will have to make decisions on their own. If we prepare them with a proper understanding of our faith and what God asks of us, they will make better decisions as opposed to approaching the world, as well as eternity, in ignorance.

Some would tell us that to respect each child's individuality, parents must allow their children to decide what they want for themselves. Of course, this is the same objective of the serpent when he told Eve, "You certainly will not die." (cf Genesis 3:4) It was the objective of the serpent to separate Eve from her Creator and he did so through deception. If we know our faith, and we help our children develop the same knowledge, we make it harder for the evil one to deceive us. If we know our faith, we enable ourselves to live to its fullness, to receive its blessings, and to accomplish what God asks of us.

Let us reflect upon this as to its meaning to our children. As we help our children to learn about their faith, we also enable them to put on its armor as a blessing of their soul. We enable them to make good decisions which also enables good relationships, not just with one another, but most importantly, their relationship with God.

Wrap Up: Well, our time has come to an end. We hope you will be able to join us next week as we turn our discussion to engaging the family in ministry.

Let us conclude with a prayer: Heavenly Father, we thank you for this opportunity to open and discuss Your Holy Word. We pray that as we go our separate ways, You will continue to walk with us and help us to see how we may put on the armor of **truth**, **righteousness**, **peace**, **faith**, **salvation**, and the **Word** of the gospel, not only for the benefit of our lives, but also the lives of all who cross our path. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, we pray. Amen.
